From the Principal,

We are coming to the end of Term One and there is much to be proud of at Nagle College. Our girls have been generous during Project Compassion and we have raised over \$4,000 for Caritas. We thank every member of our community who has contributed to making the lives of others better.

We are preparing for Easter and it is timely to reflect on the meaning of Easter: Christ's Resurrection. The Resurrection of Jesus is central to Christian faith; indeed, to be a Christian it is essential to believe that God raised Jesus from the dead. About 25 years after the Resurrection, St Paul in his letter to the people of Corinth, stated,

If there is no resurrection of the dead, then not even Christ has been raised. And if Christ has not been raised, our preaching is useless and so is your faith. 1 Cor. 15: 13,14.

It is clear from all the earliest accounts of the Resurrection that Christ was preached as having appeared to His followers not once only, but several times over many weeks. Could it have been that the first preachers of the Resurrection were deliberate liars? Did they hide the body of Christ and then spend the rest of their lives telling people that He had risen?

What, then, was the motive for such a lie, for the preaching of the Gospel brought with it no worldly advantage? The Apostles seized no land, piled up no gold, gained no political power or social status. Rather, they faced persecution from both the Jewish and Roman authorities in Palestine and throughout the empire. According to the Acts of the Apostles, in the years immediately following Christ's death, His disciples suffered imprisonment, flogging, stoning and execution. And according to the Roman historian, Tacitus, the majority of people held them in contempt and Nero had them burnt to death. Why would even one person, yet alone large groups of people, face such things for a lie? The Apostles had no motive to

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preach the Resurrection unless they believed it, and no motive to believe it unless they had seen Christ risen again.

The people who plotted the death of Jesus, namely, the Jewish authorities in Jerusalem, were fearful of the spread of Jesus' influence and were hostile to Him and His followers. If they wished to crush the new religious sect, they would simply have to produce Christ's body. That they did not, sufficiently indicates that they could not. Adapted from writings of Thomas Crean O.P.

The Resurrection does not mean that Jesus resumed His previous life as an ordinary person, rather, it means that Jesus entered another kind and level of existence. This, Jesus alluded to when He said to the robber crucified next to Him, "Truly, this day you will be with Me in paradise." Luke 23:43.

Jesus said to Martha, *I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in me will live, even though he dies; and whoever lives and believes in me will never die.*

Do not abandon yourselves to despair. We are the Easter people and hallelujah is our song.

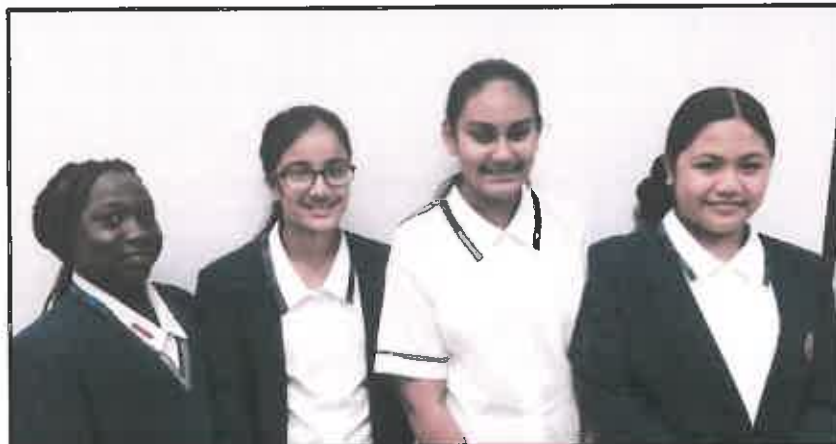

Challenge yourself by entering this competition!!!

The **Australian Mathematics Competition**, sponsored by the Commonwealth Bank, is taking place on the 30th July.

Last year 420,000 entries from nearly 4000 schools in more than 30 countries took part in this competition.

It is a competition containing 25 multiple choice problems and 5 questions requiring a number answer. The problems are very easy at the start of the paper and become progressively more difficult until the end when they are challenging to the most gifted student.

All students who take part receive a certificate showing their level of achievement and a detailed report showing how they performed on each problem.

If you are interested in taking part then place \$6.00 in an envelope with your name and Homeroom on it and hand this into the Student Office by Monday 4th May.

Knitting Club



The University of Wollongong are launching a free app for students to download from 12th April, 2015.



HSC STRESSLESS APP
University of Wollongong


The HSC Stress Less App seeks to assist HSC students to manage their stress and difficult emotions throughout this high pressure year via the use of Mindfulness Meditation. Mindfulness is the art of "intentional attention". That is, simply being able to step back and observe, in a non-judgemental manner, our inner sensations and experiences. Mindfulness is used widely in the treatment of clinical issues such as depression, anxiety, and substance abuse. It is not religiously based and requires no previous training.

What's in it for us?
We are interested in whether using the app helps students to stress less and have better mental health in their HSC year.

What's in it for you?
Whilst it's possible you may find the use of this app helpful, we are not sure how helpful it will be. You can help us find out! The information you provide will develop this project further and hopefully help us build an app that future HSC students will find easy to use and really helps!

How does it work?
The app provides audio guided meditations of varying lengths (from 1 minute to 10 minutes) which will allow you to build up your "Mindfulness Muscle" so that you are better able to "unstuck" from stressful feelings. It also takes advantage of the functions of your phone or tablet to set reminders to practice your Mindfulness skills regularly.

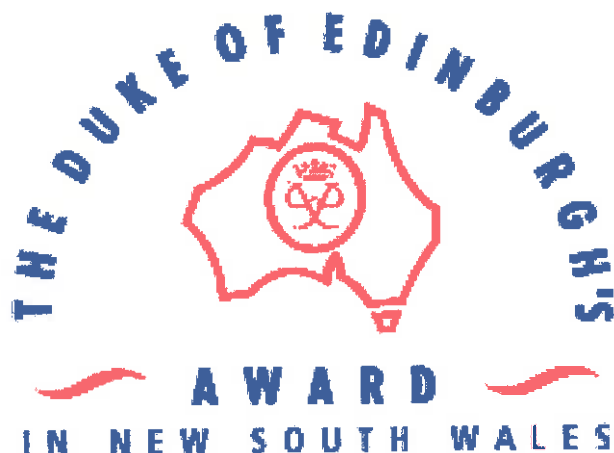
