Dear Members of the Nagle community,
Recently I attended the Nagle Education Alliance of Australia's bi-annual conference. It saw staff from Presentation schools from Western Australia, Victoria, Queensland, Tasmania and New South Wales gather together to hear from Presentation Sisters from across the globe as well as engaging speakers like Tim Costello.

We were blessed to have members of the Friends of Nano from Papua New Guinea share their experiences with us. In addition, Sister Mary Tobur from Papua New Guinea spoke of the work of the Sisters in remote communities. Ten of our Year Ten girls led prayer on the second day of the conference and we received such positive feedback about their contribution to the conference. During the conference, the presence of Nano Nagle was palpable. Her legacy certainly illuminated our work. The stories of the Sisters were indeed inspirational and called each of us present to respond the challenge of *going one step beyond*.

As the speakers shared their journeys, I was struck by the common thread: despite adversity, danger, fear, challenges and rejection, each knew that God was always with them and that they were never alone. This can be transforming. I need only to be open and receptive to God's quiet presence, listening to His encouragement, accepting His guidance. By His presence, God is revealing that we are never alone in any of the moments of our lives, even though some of these moments are dark. God never wills that we suffer, but He is there to help us make the best of it.

Rather than "going it alone", we ought to rest awhile and let God love us. In the process of turning to God, we begin to discover deep within ourselves a core of peace and courage. We begin to understand, if only briefly, what St Paul meant when he said, "... the life I live is not my own; Christ is living in me". Gal.2 20, 21. God loves unconditionally and is waiting, patiently, for us to acknowledge His presence.

As Nano Nagle wrote,

By degrees, with the assistance of God, we may do a great deal. (1770)

From the Leader of Teaching and Learning

RESOLVING CONFLICT AROUND HOMEWORK

Some of the most common disagreements that take place at home are related to schoolwork and can lead to statements like this:

- “Get off the internet and do your homework.”
- “I told you, get off your phone. I can see you are on Facebook.”
- “Why haven’t you started your homework yet?”
- “What do you mean you don’t have any homework?”

If these are common refrains in your household, there are some simple steps that can be taken to deal with this.

Step 1: Family meeting. Both students and parents get a chance to explain what is bugging them.

Step 2: Agree on how much time will be allocated to schoolwork per day or per week.

Step 3: Agree that during this time, set work must be the first priority, whether this is class homework or assessments. Any remaining time should be spent on independent learning (e.g. reviewing difficult work, making summaries, completing reading).

Step 4: Allocate set times for schoolwork. Create a schedule and put it on the fridge.

Step 5: Agree that in these blocks of time, there will be no personal technology use (preferably phones switched off and put out of sight).

Step 6: Decide on rewards and consequences if the agreement is not honoured.

English Advanced Excursion **to the Riverside Theatre**

As part of our Area of Study on Discovery, Year 12 English Advanced were granted the opportunity on Thursday the 4th of May 2017 to attend a thought-provoking and exhilarating rendition of Shakespeare's '*The Tempest*' and symposium at Parramatta Riverside Theatre. As Nagle's English faculty consistently contend, to truly appreciate Shakespearean literature one must view it in action, the way Shakespeare had intended.

So, we journeyed to Parramatta to "truly view" the play. Shuffling unknowingly into the amphitheatre, we were struck immediately by the mystical atmosphere of "the island". Dust and sediment danced in the air as the theatre darkened into a void of caliginosity, sucking us all into the preternatural, ominous world of Shakespeare's creation. Characters were no longer characters, they were real: much more defined, relatable, emotive, and from an audience's perspective. They toyed with our emotions. Our hearts sunk with Caliban's mistreatment, and beat heavy against our chests as Ariel braced us with her ominousness. For this reason, this rendition allowed for themes, characterisation, emotion and dialogue to become blatant, comprehensible *and* entertaining, unfolding in ways we had not before considered during our studies. It truly captivated us from beginning to end and was the talk of the entire cohort the whole bus ride home (every teacher's dream, right?).

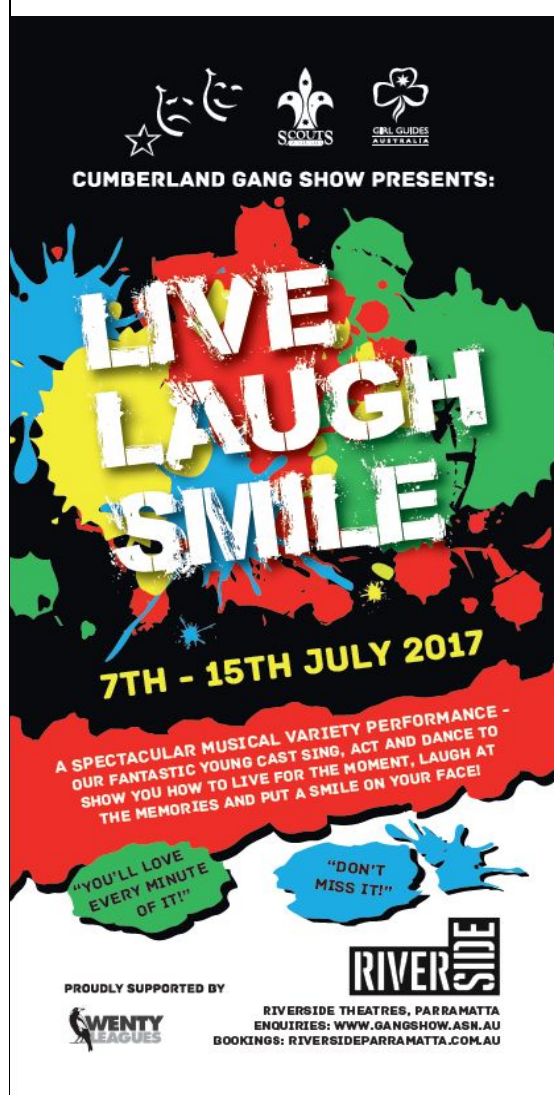

Cumberland Gang Show is two hours of live, fast-moving, musical comedy theatre for all the family. It's packed with loads of fun, fantastic sets and costumes and some wonderfully catchy songs and dances.

Cumberland Gang Show is more than what happens at the theatre, it is a huge commitment by everyone involved, who are all volunteers.

Our Gang Show began in Ryde in 1969 when 'Rip' Butler produced his first group show with a cast of 40. This grew to a full Gang Show in 1970 when "Ryde Gang Show" played at Ryde High School Auditorium. In 1988 the show moved from the old venue of Marsden High School to the new Riverside Theatre with a cast of 108 and an audience of 6000 people. Since then, apart from a one-year stint at the Hills Centre in 1990 for our 21st show, we have made Riverside our home.

Cumberland Gang Show consists of a cast of over 150 enthusiastic young people, a 20 piece orchestra, and around 250 people working behind the scenes. There are over 2,000 costumes and around 25 complete set changes every year!

Cumberland Gang Show takes over 5,000 + hours of cast rehearsals from March to July, plus over 8,000 hours of set, costume and technical preparation to give you an indication of just how well this show is produced.

The cast are not the only people to make up the show - just the people, the audience see. In fact, for every cast member on stage there are two hard workers behind the scenes.
